TRADITIONS

The film talks about some of the funerary traditions of Maori culture, especially:

- Tangi (tangihanga)
- Marae
- Whanau
- Kehua



Tangi or tangihanga: is the traditional funeral, it lasts three days and it is celebrated in the marae. The dead body is called tūpāpaku and it's buried only at the end of the celebrations because during them it is in an open coffin so that the whanau can pay their respects. The coffin is in a house in the marae called wharenui opened to the family during the day. Near the coffin whanau puts flowers and photos of the dead. Pō whakamutunga (the night of the end) is the last night, the one in which after a wake the coffin is closed forever. Then there is firstly a Christian function in a church or in the marae, secondly the burial of the body. Finally a banquet is served.

Marae: is a rectangular space surrounded by stones and sometimes terraces. It is a common or sacred place for a religious or social purpose.

Whanau: is the family that includes four generations of relatives. They can live in the same building or be present during celebrations such as tangi.

Kehua: are the spirits, in Maori culture after the death the soul of the person keeps living and remains in the marae. Talking about kehua is a tapu, which means that it is forbidden, but several maori legends tell of their appearance.

Furthermore spirits of relatives can appear to warn of imminent danger, for example in the film Mitchell appears to save his brother from drowning in a river.



ANALOGIES WITH ITALIAN CULTURE

There are also some **analogies** between the Maori culture and the Italian culture, some examples are:

-The Marae can be relate to church, cathedrals and oratory because all of them are places for praying and for socializing with people of the same community

-Kehua can be related to the people's soul because both, after death, are some sorts of spirits that try to help their family members to reach what they want

-Tapu can be associated with the Christian use to not name God in vain, insulting God is a forbidden action like a tapu
